A FAILURE TO COMMUNICATE

The Korean War, in which the 1st Marine Division fought and won some of its most brutal battles, was not without its humor. During one such conflict a ROK (Republic of Korea) commander, whose unit was fighting along with the Marines, called then Marine Lt. Col. Chesty Puller, to report a major Chinese attack in his sector.

"How many Chinese are attacking you?" asked Puller

"Many, many Chinese!" replied the excited Korean officer.

General Puller asked for another count and got the same answer, "Many, many, many Chinese!"

"#%\$@*^\$@#!" swore General Puller, "Put my Marine liaison officer on the radio.

In a minute, an American voice came over the air: "Yes sir?"

"Lieutenant," growled Chesty, exactly how many Chinese you got up there?"

"General, we got a whole shitload of Chinese up here!"

"Thank God." exclaimed Puller, "At least there's someone up there who knows how to count."

From a blog of Ted Dey at Book My Reunion and Armed Forces Reunions August 2016. We have used his services a number of times and I thought you would enjoy this reunion anecdote.

This week Armed Forces Reunions is hosting The Chosin Few in San Diego – heroes from the Battle of the Chosin Reservoir, a brutal 17-day battle in freezing weather during The Korean War. Their amazing story and how the Tootsie Roll saved the day bears repeating. The First Marine Division, along with elements of two Army regimental combat teams, were completely surrounded by over 120,000 Chinese troops in rugged mountains. In the worst winter in Korean history daytime temperatures averaged five degrees below zero, while nights plunged to minus 35 and lower. Jeep

batteries froze and split. C-rations ran low and cans were frozen solid. If truck engines stopped, their fuel lines froze. 60-millimeter mortars were the most valuable weapon the Marines had to break up wave after wave of Chinese assaults, but the supply of mortar rounds was quickly depleted. Resupply could only come by air and that was spotty in such foul weather.

The Marines' requests for resupply were sent by radio, using the code words for 60mm mortar ammo: "Tootsie Rolls." But the radio operator receiving the request, not having the Marines' code sheets, passed along the need for Tootsie Rolls, of which there were tons at supply bases in Japan. Parachutes bearing pallet-loads of Tootsie Rolls descended on the Marines. Initially befuddled, the troops thawed the frozen Tootsie Rolls in armpits

and their sugar provided instant energy. For many, Tootsie Rolls were their only nourishment for days. Warmed Tootsie Rolls were also used to plug bullet holes in fuel drums, gas tanks, cans and radiators, where they would freeze solid again, sealing the leaks.

After two weeks of utter misery and suffering 3,000 killed in action and 6,000 wounded they reached the sea, demolishing several Chinese divisions along the way. Hundreds credited their very survival to Tootsie Rolls. At every Chosin Few reunion since the war Tootsie Roll Industries has shipped pallets of Tootsie Rolls to the reunion hotel. But ask any Marine and he'll tell you a good Tootsie Roll is a frozen one.

Hotel Marine with Medal of Honor Recipient

Sonny Heinonen had the honor of meeting and conversing with Hershel "Woody" Williams one of six surviving Medal of Honor recipients of WWII... his was for acts on Iwo Jima. Woody was the guest speaker at the D Day reenactment in Conneaut.

Woody Williams was turned away once from the U.S. military for being too short, he successfully enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve in Charleston, West Virginia on May 26, 1943. Woody received his recruit training at MCRD San Diego, California. Upon completion, he was sent to the Camp Elliott training center in San Diego, where he joined the tank training battalion on August 21, 1943. The following month he was transferred to the training center's infantry battalion for instruction as a demolition man and in the use of flamethrowers.

Woody joined the 32nd Replacement Battalion on October 30, 1943, and left for New Caledonia on December 3 aboard the M.S. *Weltey Reden*. In January 1944, he joined the 3rd Marine Division at Guadalcanal, attached to the 1st Battalion, 21st Marines, first to Company C and then to Headquarters Company.

During July and August 1944, he participated in action at Guam, and in October he rejoined Company C.

Medal of Honor action

His next campaign was at Iwo Jima. Landing on February 21, 1945, Two days later when tanks, trying to open a lane for infantry, encountered a network of reinforced concrete pillboxes, buried mines, and black volcanic sands. Williams went forward alone with his 70-pound flamethrower to attempt the reduction of devastating machine gun fire from the unyielding positions

Covered by only four riflemen, he fought for four hours under terrific enemy small-arms fire and repeatedly returned to his own lines to prepare



demolition charges and obtain serviced flame throwers. He returned to the front, frequently to the rear of hostile emplacements, to wipe out one position after another. At one point, a wisp of smoke alerted him to the air vent of a Japanese bunker, and he approached close enough to put the nozzle of his flamethrower through the hole, killing the occupants. On another occasion, he was charged by enemy riflemen who attempted to stop him with bayonets and he killed them with a burst of flame from his weapon.

These actions occurred on the same day as the flag raisings on Mount Suribachi, although Williams was not able to witness the event. He fought through the remainder of the five-week-long battle and was wounded on March 6, for which he was awarded the Purple Heart.

In September 1945, he returned to the United States and was presented the Medal of Honor by President Harry S. Truman on October 5, 1945, at the White House.



D-Day Conneaut is fast becoming America's premier living history event by being the most realistic and educational annual reenactment of D-Day - June 6th, 1944. Since 1999, this annual recreation of the amphibious Allied landings upon the beaches of Normandy, France, has thrilled thousands of spectators. The event occurs within the beautifully kept grounds of Conneaut Township Park, Conneaut, Ohio, and assembles over 1,200 re-enactors from across the United States and Canada. Remarkably, the 250 yard long beach and sloping adjacent terrain closely resemble Omaha Beach in Normandy, France. (<http://www.ddayohio.us>)
